SJBAS Monthly Meeting Is our Annual Meeting: December 7

Our monthly speaker meetings resume on January 8.

President's Message – State of the Society -- 2024

Greetings fellow members:

Our membership is up 26% at 186, and finances reflect that increase. Janice once again assembled an outstanding series of monthly programs on topics of current interest which introduced many people to SJBAS. This included presentations about the famous "Lucy" found in Africa, various aspects of the Chaco



phenomenon, rock art, and the 23,000-year-old foot prints found at White Sands. Tish followed up with membership invitations distributed to visitors, and many did so.

Field Trips: Most of our trips were successful despite weather and other issues beyond our control that caused some cancellations. People went to Chaco, Bears Ears, Keet Seel and other premier sites in our region. We have established some credibility with the BLM concerning permits for access to Bears Ears/Cedar Mesa and received "Letter of Agreement" permits again for this year. Hopefully this will continue.

Promotion: This year we have made a considerable effort to expand our public presence. In addition to the usual announcements in local media, we placed archaeology exhibits promoting

the society in two local libraries for a month. At the Durango Visitors Center, site etiquette materials were added to the brochures promoting area archaeological attractions. In an effort to inspire the next generation of professional and avocational archaeologist, members conducted an experimental archaeology class for 6 area schools and two civic groups. Participants learned about, and tried their hand at, fire bow drills, making yucca twine, pine pitch glue, flint knapping, and use of the atlatl. In total, over 700 students experienced a day with the Neolithic technology used by ancient indigenous people. Proper site etiquette and the difference between scientific archaeology and curio collecting were also discussed.

The society also hosted the world premiere of "Written on the Landscape," a film produced by the Solstice Project which documents Chaco outlier sites. Over 450 people attended the event. We had informational materials displayed in the lobby and several membership forms were handed out.

We continue to promote Indigenous Involvement and perspectives in our programs. This year we had an excellent presentation by Venancio Aragon, a Diné textile artist, on "The Survival of Diné textile traditions". We also have a service work day planned for next year on the Ute Mountain Ute Reservation.

Advocacy: Times have changed and our access to many of the unique regional archaeological sites has come under regulatory scrutiny by land management agencies. Educational organizations such as ours are often categorized as similar to commercial guide services and competitive events, and the associated fees and permit requirements are beyond our capability. Therefore, it has become imperative that SJBAS become recognized as a responsible regional educational organization. Establishing and maintaining that credibility is critical to our continued access.

There are additional potential challenges facing us. These include review and possible reduction of park and monument boundaries, expanded oil and gas development and some discussions of turning management of national parks and monuments over to tribal governments. Repeal of the Antiquities Act is a real possibility.

We have attempted to gain recognition by providing input to land management agency master plans and contributed financially to conservation organizations such as the Bears Ears Inter-Tribal Coalition and Bears Ears Partnership.

In addition, we joined the Council of Allied Societies which is an avocational subsection of the Society for American Archaeology. It includes 29 members from across the country and requires site etiquette and membership criteria that matches those of SJBAS. In addition, the group provides access to educational resources, archaeology related news, and government/regulatory issues affecting archaeology groups such as ours.

I look forward to continued achievements in the coming year and hope to see you are the at the Holiday Brunch and Annual Meeting on December 7th.
