Our Annual Meeting and Brunch was well attended and the festivities were enjoyable. The two student interns we sponsored last year gave interesting and informative presentations on their activities.

Mark and Michelle McKibben were recognized for their years of service as social chairs and presented

with a gift certificate to Maria's Bookstore so they may get more travel guides. Two new volunteers, Tammy and Joel Barger were introduced and welcomed as their replacements. An event of note scheduled for 2025 is the 28th annual "Saving Places Conference" sponsored by the Colorado Preservation, Inc. and held in Colorado Springs, Colorado, starting, January 29th through Friday, February 1st, 2025. The conference will focus on the theme "intangible heritage," which encompasses the cultural, social, and historical practices, traditions, knowledge, and expressions deeply rooted in a community's identity and collective memory.
